## Noteworthy People Who Owned 1st Generation Colt SAA Revolvers

This list provides the serial numbers of 360 1st Generation Colt SAA revolvers owned by noteworthy people. Some of these people are famous, like Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, Johnny Ringo, and Doc Holliday. Others may be unfamiliar to you. They include Texas gunman involved with the 1880s Johnson County War; Mosses Milner, a civilian scout for the 7th Cavalry; Edwin Tewksbury, a main character in the Pleasant Valley War; and Jeff Kidder, a legendary Arizona Ranger and gunfighter.
